High School, 1939, 1952, 1955  
and 1957 in possession of the  
Library now online. Also  
included are three Vance Coun-  
ty Annuals: Townsville, 1957  
and 1958 and Dabney 1949.

The North Carolina Digital  
Heritage Center is a statewide  
digitization and digital publish-  
ing program housed in the N.C.  
Collection at the University of  
North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The Digital Heritage Center  
works with cultural heritage in-  
stitutions and libraries across  
North Carolina to digitize and  
publish historic materials on-  
line.

"I think this gives Granville  
County residents and research-  
ers a terrific resource for com-  
munity history and memory",  
said Nicholas Graham, Pro-  
gram Coordinator.

It is hoped that the publicity  
and awareness of the Annuals  
Project will encourage people  
to allow their yearbooks to be  
reproduced by local libraries,  
or donated to such institutions.

"School annuals can be a  
wonderful genealogical source  
and are sometimes the only  
public source available for a  
photo of a particular individual  
or even a local business," said  
N.C. Room Specialist, Mark  
Pace. "For example, someone  
recently wanted a good picture  
of the old Pine State Creamery,  
but couldn't locate one any-  
where. Sure enough a high  
school annual from 1968 had a  
picture of the business in an  
advertisement in the back sec-

tion of the yearbook-local busi-  
nesses were often yearbook  
sponsors. A lot of folks don't  
think of an old school yearbook  
sitting in an attic as a historical  
resource-but it certainly can  
be," said Pace.

The Perry Memorial Library  
in Henderson is also a partici-  
pant in the project. Twenty-five  
Vance County annuals dating  
back to 1926 are online.
