New "Sights and Sounds" Collection Features Moving Images and Oral Histories

From Grandfather Mountain to the Outer Banks, locations across the state are represented in the newest collection on DigitalNC: North Carolina Sights and Sounds. Thanks in part to funds from the Digital Public Library of America, we asked our partners to nominate audiovisual materials from their libraries and museums for a pilot digitization project, to help assess the demand for this type of work. Films, videos, and cassettes with both known and unknown content were nominated and chosen.

Truly a wide variety of audiovisual materials are now online in the Sights and Sounds collection. You can watch Rockingham County Public Library's bookmobile visit a school in 1939. You can listen to residents of Nash County describe their experiences in World War II or in tobacco fields. You can see Cynthia Watts interview visual artists, musicians, and dancers in a number of "Arts in Durham" films from the late 1970s-early 1980s.



You can view silent films from H. Lee Waters, who filmed everyday life in small North Carolina towns (like Wadesboro, *above*) in the 1930s and 1940s.

In the end, we were able to digitize over 140 physical items from 11 institutions! Head over to DigitalNC.org and explore the many Sights and Sounds of the state.

REYNOLDA HOUSE MUSEUM OF AMERICAN ART: CORRESPONDENCE AND COLLECTIONS OF THE REYNOLDS FAMILY

Reynolda, a sprawling estate in the northwest part of Winston-Salem, was home to tobacco magnate R. J. Reynolds; his wife, Katharine; and his four children. Correspondence and photographs from the **Reynolda House Museum of American Art**, shared on DigitalNC.org, reveal the privileges of wealth and the nuanced personalities of this ambitious family. The balance of the letters comes from Katharine, showing her assertive efforts at managing the construction at the estate, daily life and elaborate events, and also many of her husband's business affairs after he fell

ill. There are also panoramic photographs and plans, and two photo albums from R. J. Reynolds' daughter, Mary Katharine Reynolds Babcock. This collection is a good example of how correspondence can be organized and shared through DigitalNC.org.

NEWSPAPER DIGITIZATION



AMCO NEWS, MEL-ROSE-GLEN, SEW IT SEAMS

High Point, well known for its furniture industry, has also been home to numerous textile plants (like many towns in North Carolina). We've discovered how frequently mills published their own newspapers in the 20th century. These three titles, from the **High Point Museum**, are typical of the genre. While it might seem that company publications like these are of narrow interest, they are filled with information about their employees' families and local events.



THE N.C. ESSAY

With notable alumni throughout the arts, the North Carolina School of the Arts in Winston-Salem has been in operation since 1965. The pages of the school's student newspaper, the N.C. Essay, are graced with images from dance performances and plays. They describe school events and achievements. One of only two high schools that are part of the UNC System, the School of the Arts has shared the first 10 years of its student paper online.

EZ Digitization Grants for 2014-2015

Over the past months, the North Carolina Digital Heritage Center has partnered with Rockingham County Public Library and Forsyth County Public Library on their EZ Digitization Grants. These grants are funded through the Library Services and Technology Act and distributed by the State Library of North Carolina. Through an EZ Digitization Grant, a library can increase its local capacity to digitize materials. The Center consults with grant awardees and also provides digitization and digital publishing services.

If your institution has a project idea in mind for an EZ Digitization Grant, get in touch with us and we'd be happy to brainstorm with you. The deadline for the next cycle of grants is **February 26, 2016**.

ROCKINGHAM COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY

Rockingham County Public Library has been a long time partner, and they had already shared a variety of materials through the Rockingham County Legacy

project (a partnership with Rockingham Community College and the Museum and Archives of Rockingham County). Their EZ Digitization Grant has allowed them

to increase both the amount digitized by the Digital Heritage Center as well as their local capacity

to digitize materials at the library. As part of this project, numerous family history materials, including indepth research by John T. Dallas, have been added to DigitalNC.


DIGITAL PUBLIC LIBRARY OF AMERICA

The North Carolina Digital Heritage Center provides digitization and digital publishing services to cultural heritage organizations in North Carolina. Any organization that is open to the public and holds rare or unique materials related to the history and culture of North Carolina is eligible to work with the Digital Heritage Center. We have worked with libraries, archives, museums, and historical societies from around the state, ranging from very small organizations run by a single person to large academic institutions.
