GREENE COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY

LEE COUNTY LIBRARIES

Lee County Libraries' main library is located in Sanford, N.C. and houses their local history collection. Lee County, founded in 1907, is one of North Carolina's newest counties, but the history of the area goes back to before the Revolutionary War. Our first batch for Lee County included several hundred truly amazing photographs of Sanford, yearbooks from Lee County high schools, and minutes from a local literary women's club, the Pierian Club.

Project Highlight

VOICES OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH WOMEN

This quarter we published 69 records from the "Voices of the Episcopal Church

Women" project at **Saint Augustine's University**, a Historically Black college located in Raleigh, N.C. The collection included 31 recorded oral history interviews with women involved in the Black Episcopal Church in North Carolina, with many of them also closely involved with Saint Augustine's as well. Photographs and papers of the women were also digitized as part of this project. These materials contribute to St. Augustine's rich history by providing insight into the connections among education, church and community.

Annual Advisory Board Meeting

In July we held our annual advisory board meeting. During this meeting we reported on statistics from the previous fiscal year, anecdotes, notable additions to DigitalNC, and technology updates. We also previewed Primary Source Sets, a new feature on DigitalNC's site. With content created by Sophie Hollis and new website infrastructure built out by Stephanie Williams, these primary source sets are based on particular topics and provide items from the collection as well as context surrounding those topics. More to come about these sets in the next Quarterly Report!

Technology Update

In addition to regular maintenance activities, Stephanie completed work this quarter to update DigitalNC's analytics reporting system, including pulling historic data into a brandnew Partner Analytics tool. She also made improvements to internal workflow tools and public search interfaces in response to user feedback, processed 31 newspaper batches and corrections, updated the annual partner survey, developed a 'cover image' to add to records whose images may contain harmful content, and built a workflow for processing Zooniverse-transcribed handwritten newspapers into NDNP format. The latter half of the quarter was focused on building new infrastructure to support the previously mentioned Primary Source Sets project, including improvements to the "Resources" section of DigitalNC as well as a new print and download utility.

Consultations

For this statistic, we're counting NCDHC full-time staff consulting on NCDHC services, digitization, digital publication or another related topic. These consultations are substantive, last at least 10–15 minutes, can take place virtually or in person, and do not include presentations or workshops.

Examples this quarter include meeting with OCLC about a training program, an interview with a SILS student, and providing community scanning day advice.
